The purpose of academic advising at SIUE is: 1. To guide students in formulating educational plans


2. To assist students in achieving their academic, career-related, and personal goals at the University

- Upon meeting the basic milestones you will transition to advisement in your department of major

# Advisor & Students Responsibilities



#### How can your advisor assist you?

- Discuss your academic and career goals, and help you identify possible degree options.
- Help you plan your coursework to make the most of your time.
- Provide resources and campus referrals that will maximize your success.
- Help with your adjustment to university life.
- Assist you through your academic experience.

### Meeting with your advisor!

You have to meet 3 times with your advisor every semester:

- 1. Check in the first 2 weeks of the semester
- 2. Mandatory Advising for each semester

September/October in the Fall February/March in the Spring

3. Follow- up end of semester



#### Advisor Responsibilities

- Help guide students through the development of their short- and long-term educational plans.
- Provide accurate information regarding university programs, requirements, resources, policies, procedures and student services.
- Provide appropriate referrals to university support services
- Provide instruction regarding the culture of the University.
- Provide instruction regarding college level academic expectations.
- Address questions and concerns thoughtfully and respectfully.
- Present students with options.

#### **Student Responsibilities**

- Be informed regarding academic programs and requirements.
- Prepare a written list of questions before each meeting with



- your advisor.
- Arrive fifteen minutes early for your academic advising appointment.
- Know the Academic Calendar. Do not miss deadlines. Know when to register and drop or add courses.
- Be knowledgeable or ask your advisor regarding university policies and procedures


#### **International Students**

- All international undergraduate students are required to have full-time enrollment 12-13 hours or more due to F1 visa requirements.
- MUST egister for at least 4 courses per semester and mandatory FST 101 during first semester
- Typically, each course has 3 credit hours = 3 hours/times per week that you have to attend the class.
- There are other courses that have more credit hours 4 or 5 due to curriculum, lab or other requirements.
- Courses typically meet either 3 times per week Monday Wednesday - Friday or two days Tu

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
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
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
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You must register in face-to-face classes. Only one on-line class is allowed if needed.

- You must register for ENG 101 or ENG 101N (English for non-native speakers)
- You must register for FST 101 (First Semester Transition Course)

### **Foundations:**

## All Foundations courses are required for every student.

- English Composition I (ENG 101)
- English Composition II (ENG 102)
- Public Speaking(ACS101) or (ACS 103– Engineering Students)
- Reasoning & Argumentation (RA 101)
- Quantitative Reasoning (QR 101)

In some rare instances, proficiency tests or other department approved classes may be accepted in the place of a Foundations class.

### **Breadth Requirements:**

Each student must complete one course in each of the following Breadth areas.

- Fine & Performing Arts BFPA
- Humanities BHUM
- Info & Communication in Society BICS
- Life Science -BLS
- Physical Science BPS
- Social Science BSS

Breadth Attributes are assigned to various courses that will meet the requirement. Many times, **Breadth areas are completed by courses that are required for majors and will vary with each major.** 

#### **Experiences**

Each student must complete one course in each of the following experience areas.

- First Year Transition Seminar (FST)
- Laboratory Experience
- U.S. Race, Gender and Equity (ERGU)
- Global Cultures, Race and Equity (EREG)
- Health Experience

If a course satisfies both the ERGU and EREG requirements, students will be given credit for one of the attributes and need to take a course that fulfills the other attribute.

### **Objectives For The Baccalaureate Degree:**

- The purposes of baccalaureate education at Southern Illinois University Edwardsville (SIUE) are to provide students with a solid foundation for intellectual development and an ability and desire to make contributions to society.
