## **Abstract**

<u>Introduction</u>: Young adults often face decisions that can significantly impact their lives, including the choice to experiment with medications that do or don't belong to them, whether prescription or over the counter (OTC). This poses serious risks, such as accidental overdose, addiction, and even death.
