

Main Drivers for Pursuing Pharmacy Residencies

BACKGROUND

- Over the past decade, the landscape of pharmacy has begun to change to due a larger number of pharmacists entering the workforce.
- From 2014 to 2018 PharmD graduates in the U.S. increased by 7.2%.
- In the same time frame applicants for post-graduation residency training programs increased by 23%. Similarly, pharmacy residency programs increased by 23% between 2014 and 2018.
- In 2018, there were 6,637 PGY-1 and 1,160 PGY-2 candidates applying for 3,652 and 783 respective positions. Therefore, 56% of applicants did not receive placement in a residency program.
- There is no current research on why students choose to do residencies and if they are truly necessary to achieve their ideal career.

METHODS

Study Design

- Survey
- The IRB approved survey was distributed via email and responses were submitted voluntarily.
- Results were collected and analyzed by Qualtrics Survey Software

Study Population

- Students currently enrolled in SIUE School of Pharmacy for the 2019-2020 academic school year
- Alumni of the SIUE School of Pharmacy


Data Collected

- Demographic information such as:
 - Age, Gender, Race
 - Status in SIUE School of Pharmacy (e.g. P1, P2, P3, P4, alumni)
 - Location where they are from and where they wish to practice
- Collected information included:
 - Assessing knowledge about residency programs
 - Decision to pursue residency applications

Table 1: Response to: "How would you describe a pharmacy residency?" N=165 *Responses chosen at random*


A period of time a pharmacist takes after graduation to learn more about pharmacy with hands- on experience.


optional post graduate extensive training that is required to be obtained if pursuing a clinical position

Figure 4: Student and Alumni Response to: "The School of Pharmacy advocates for students to pursue pharmacy residencies."




Table 2: Response to "Please explain how your attitude about pharmacy has changed since beginning the SIUE School of Pharmacy." N=150 *Responses chosen at random*
