**Lincoln Land Community College
Associate of Arts Psychology**

Completion of an Associate of Science degree at Lincoln Land Community College fulfills SIUE’s general education requirements with the exception of an Interdisciplinary Studies course that all students must take during their junior or senior year at SIUE.

This “Transfer Program Guide” is an *example* of proposed curriculum for students to use while completing their associate’s degree. Reading, writing, and math placement could alter the course sequencing and transfer date. Therefore, students should begin sequencing their reading/writing (if applicable) and math & science courses during the first semester, paying particular attention to prerequisites. Students have the option of taking summer classes to lessen fall and spring course loads.

A minor is required for students who major in Psychology. Options for a double major, double minor, or a single minor are available. Courses taken at LLCC to meet LLCC’s general education requirements (including electives) can be used for the minor(s) or additional major. Students should begin planning early for any of these options.

Students must complete 50% or more of the degree requirements at SIUE.

Students have 2 options when pursuing a Bachelor's degree in Psychology

A Bachelor of Arts degree will require 2 semesters of the same foreign language, which can be taken at either LLCC or SIUE, in addition to 8 Humanities and/or Fine Arts Courses (some of which will be completed with the Associate in Arts.)

A Bachelor of Science degree will require completion of 8 courses in life, physical, or social science, in addition to 2 courses with a lab component (all of which will be met with the completion of the Associate in Arts.)

AMMISSION REQUIREMENTS

A cumulative GPA of 2.25 or higher (on a 4.0 scale)

Transfer

Students who wish to major in psychology and who transfer from community colleges must complete at least 15 hours of 300- and 400-level psychology courses at SIUE (or other accredited four-year institutions and SIUE combined). Students who wish to major in psychology and who transfer from accredited four-year institutions must complete at least 12 hours of psychology courses at SIUE. PSYC 220/221 may not be transferred in to satisfy SIUE psychology requirements. If you are a transfer student just beginning your curriculum at SIUE comparable statistics and research methods courses completed at another four-year university can be evaluated for transfer credit on a case-by-case basis.
